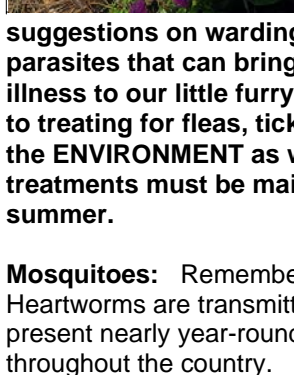




### Fleas, Ticks and Mosquitoes...Oh My!



Summer is here and as many of us welcome the season, we also dread the pests that come with those warm sunny days. But never fear, relief isn't an impossible goal to reach. Below are a few suggestions on warding off those pesky little parasites that can bring so much discomfort and illness to our little furry friends. Remember the key to treating fleas, ticks and mosquitoes is treating the ENVIRONMENT as well as the dog and these treatments must be maintained throughout the summer.

**Mosquitoes:** Remember to use heartworm preventive. Heartworms are transmitted by mosquitoes, which are present nearly year-round in southern regions and throughout the country.

Keep pets indoors during times when mosquitoes are most active -- dawn, dusk and early evening.

Eliminate areas of standing water that can serve as breeding grounds for mosquitoes, and remember to recheck after each rainfall.

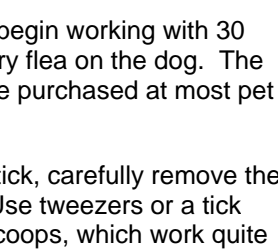
Change any outdoor water bowls a couple times a day to prevent mosquitoes from using them to lay their eggs.

Some topical flea and tick control products for dogs such as K9 Advantix now contain mosquito repellent.

The APCC does not recommend the use of mosquito control products that contain DEET. Dogs and cats are extremely sensitive to DEET and may develop neurological problems if a product formulated with DEET is applied to them.

Avoid using pest control products with concentrated essential oils such as tea tree, pennyroyal and d-limonene. Concentrates of these products have caused weakness, paralysis, liver problems and seizures in pets, plus their effectiveness is not proven.

**Fleas and Ticks:** Fleas and ticks cause a variety of problems in pets. Fleas feed on animal blood and can trigger problems including skin irritation, allergic reactions, anemia and in rare cases, death. They can also carry tapeworms, which can infest your pet. If you see small rice-like particles around the dog's anus or in his feces, he probably has tapeworms.



Ticks carry diseases such as Lyme and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, so you don't want them feeding on your pet either.

To catch fleas and ticks early on, comb your pet with a flea comb. Remember to check between the toes, behind and in the ears, in the armpits, around the tail and head. A clever tip: comb your pet over white paper. If fleas are present, you will see tiny black specks fall on the paper.

**Flea Removal:** Capstar tablets begin working within 30 minutes and will kill virtually every flea on the dog. The tablets are affordable and can be purchased at most pet supply stores.

**Tick Removal:** When finding a tick, carefully remove the whole tick from the pet's body. Use tweezers or a tick scoop for removing ticks. Tick scoops, which work quite well, are available at many pet supply stores. See [www.tickedoff.com](#) for details

**Prevention, Treating Pets:** Keep your pets healthy. Fleas and other parasites have less effect on healthy animals...and they tend to live on pets who are unhealthy and/or have weak immune systems.

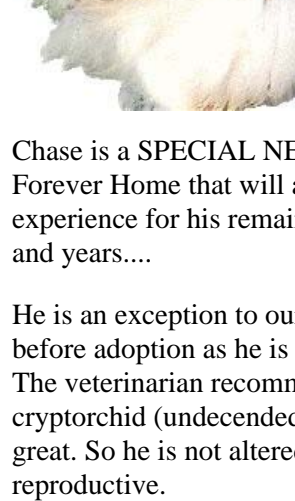
There are many modern effective flea and tick products, including several "spot on" types that are easy to apply to the skin such as Frontline (which is effective for killing fleas and ticks) and K9 Advantix (effective for fleas, ticks and mosquitoes). You may not need to use them year-round depending on your climate, but you should consider using them monthly during flea and tick seasons. Ask your veterinarian about effective medications, and learn the facts about the pest prevention you use. You can also find details about various products on the web.

Keep in mind that some adult-strength products are too harsh for young puppies, and that dog and cat products are not interchangeable since the strengths and formulas of the products differ.

Insect growth regulators (IGR) like lufenuron, methoprene, and pyriproxyfen can be used in combination or alone with other flea control/flea-killing products. They can help break the flea life cycle by inhibiting flea maturation. IGRs include Precor (used inside the home), Program (a pill taken orally by the pet), and Archer and FleaFix (which are applied to the environment by spray indoors and outdoors). Some pet owners pair Program with one of the topical products (such as Frontline) mentioned above.

Sweet little Chase is about 6.0 lbs; has no teeth which lets his tongue hang out from time to time, but very happy, perky little guy.

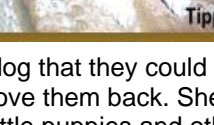
Very friendly and loves to be with his foster mom -- to cuddle and a sleep companion.

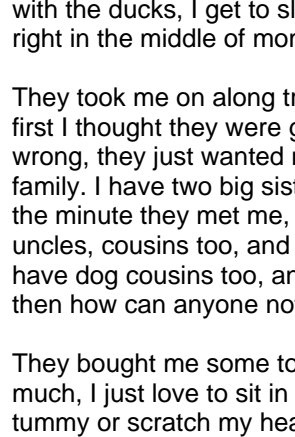

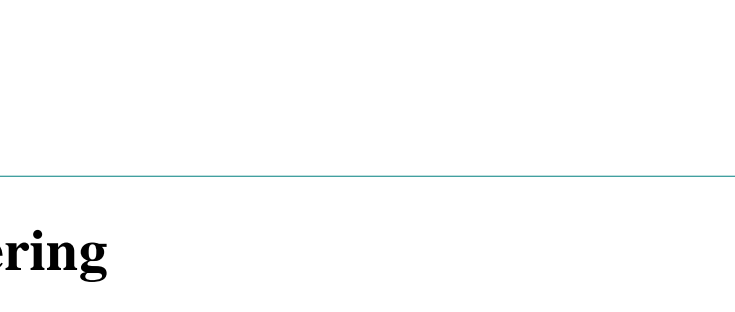

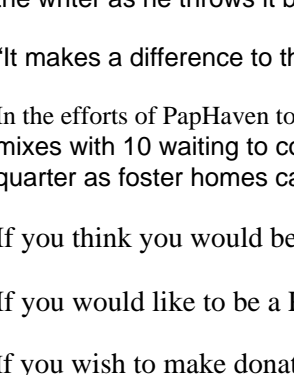

## Joys of Fostering



Loren Eiseley tells the story of a writer who is vacationing in a hotel on the coast and decides to take a break from his work by strolling along the sandy beach. In the distance, he spies a person whom he believes, at the time, is dancing, and is so intrigued he investigates further.

As he approaches the "dancer," he realizes it is a young man and he is not dancing, but throwing objects from the beach into the ocean. He gets closer still and discovers that the man is picking up starfish from the beach, where thousands have been stranded by low tide, and is throwing them back, one by one, into the ocean.

The writer asks the man why he is undertaking such a task and the man replies that if he does not, the starfish will certainly die.

At this, the writer scoffs and informs the man that there are miles and miles of beach and tens of thousands of starfish and he can't possibly believe that what he is doing will make a difference.

The young man pauses and gives thought to this observation. Then, picking up another starfish from the beach, he tells the writer as he throws it back into the ocean...

## Questions

**Q. Every time we have a thunderstorm my dog gets very scared and she appears uncomfortable and she only wants to hide in my arms. What can I do to help her?**

A. Many dogs, especially in the southeast experience "storm phobia" which can get worse over time and if not handled carefully can lead to further problems simply by the amount of stress it places the dog under. The first response of many is to soothe your dog, this sends the signal that her behavior is okay and reinforces her fears. If you start early you may be able to help her get over her fears through behavior modification. One method is to try to simply ignore the storm and find an indoor activity to entertain her as the storm passes. This is a great opportunity to work on learning obedience or tricks. Playing the TV or radio or running an fan can assist in drowning out the noise. If she is young she could improve over time. Medications are also available and though they may be controversial to some they do have a track record for being effective, especially in older dogs where behavior modification alone may not be an option. If you have a young dog that has extreme phobia the use of medication in parallel with behavior modification may do the trick. The important thing is to address the issue, talk to your veterinarian and don't allow your dog to suffer through another storm, it can be life threatening in some cases.

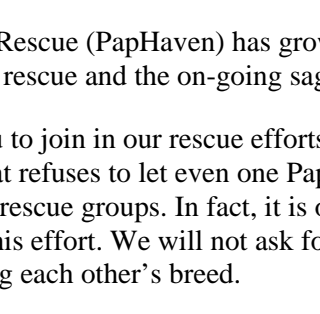

**Did You Know???**  
**Dangerous Bones**  
Cooked chicken, turkey and other bird bones can be fatal to a dog, so never give them as chew toys. These bones are hollow, and when chewed they splinter into sharp fragments which can then pierce your dog's intestinal lining. This can be very difficult to treat.

**Controlling Puppy Chewing**  
If you catch your pup in the act of chewing anything but his own toy, remove the object and replace it with an acceptable chew toy. If your pup then chews on his toy, praise him. Always reinforce desired behavior with praise. Praising a dog when it acts correctly is more effective than yelling No! when it misbehaves.

## Health Alerts

**Warning: Counterfeit Advantage and Frontline**

Heatstroke Warning!  
While it may be healthy for you to work up a summer sweat for our dogs it can be life threatening. Your dogs normal body temperature is 100.5 to 102.5 degrees Fahrenheit. If it rises to 105 or 106 degrees, the dog is at risk for developing heat exhaustion. If the body temperature rises to 107 degrees, your dog has entered the dangerous zone of heat stroke. With heat stroke, irreversible damage and death can occur within minutes. Dogs that have a thick coat, shorter muzzles, are overweight or who have heart or lung problems can be at a greater risk. Also at greater risk are senior dogs and young puppies. Any good owner should know how to avoid overheating your dog and how to recognize signs of heat exhaustion. Here are some tips that can you be a cool owner during the hot season:

- **Don't leave your dog in a parked car!** The temperature in a parked car can reach 160 degrees in a matter of minutes, even with partial open windows.
- **Avoid exercising your dog during the hottest hours of the day.** Even with plenty of water your dog can still overheat. Restrict the long walks and running for early morning or late afternoon hours. If your dog is outside for any extended period of time be sure he has a cool, shady place for a rest and plenty of cool water. Be sure to place the water bowl in the shade.
- **Always provide plenty of cool water, before during and after heat exposure.**
- **Know what to watch for!** You know your dog better than anyone and should be able to recognize that he is uncomfortably hot by his behavior, if he appears uncomfortable and is panting heavily with a dripping wet red tongue, give him a rest. If your dog becomes sluggish or unresponsive, begins to vomit or collapse, treat this as an emergency and go to the vet immediately, use a wet towel or a spray bottle to help cool him down on the way.

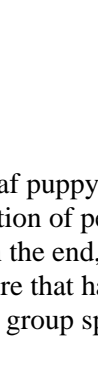
## PapHaven News & Events
